

FROM LOSS TO RENEWAL: Hope Grows in Western Jamaica

In a powerful story of community resilience, the Trees That Feed Foundation (TTFF), in partnership with Northern Caribbean University (NCU) and local Jamaican organizations, has brought hope and sustenance to communities recovering from Hurricane Melissa.

Following the devastating storm, which stripped the hillsides of western Jamaica, TTFF quickly secured 1,000 breadfruit seedlings from longtime nursery partner, Mr. Alfred McLean. The Forestry Department of Jamaica assisted in preparing the trees for planting.



NCU lecturer Nadia Washington-Daley, a native of the Cave community, designed a pilot project to replant food-bearing trees. She mobilized 25 university students from the Biology, Chemistry & Environmental Sciences Department to plant the trees across a three-mile stretch of land. This effort was more than just service; it was education, ecology, and hope in action.



This initiative is a critical step in building long-term food security and environmental resilience for the people of Jamaica, made possible through strong community collaboration and support. Ms. Washington-Daley's ultimate goal is to plant a minimum of 10,000 food-bearing trees across the five hardest-hit parishes.

Trees That Feed Foundation, headquartered in Winnetka, works with farmers and organizations in 20 countries in Africa, the Caribbean, and Central America. Its vision is seeing self-sustaining communities and entrepreneurs, based on agroforestry.
